Check Your Coverage

Pelican Pointe Homeowners Association maintains property and liability insurance as required by the governing documents, specifically identified within the Association Declarations (aka CC&R's). In addition to the insurance purchased by the Association, each owner is also assigned a responsibility to repair and/or replace limited property, including liability, for the space located within each privately owned/occupied home. As a reminder, Pelican Pointe may assign the Association's \$5,000.00 Deductible to the owner(s) benefiting from the use of the Association's insurance when responding to losses within the interior space of each home.

Pelican Pointe Owners can cover their individual exposures by purchasing a personal insurance policy known as an HO-6 or Condo/Townhome Insurance plan. Owners should contact their personal agent to review their exposures and ensure they are adequately protected in the event of a loss.

Susman Unleashed

Garbage in. Garbage out. No, I'm not talking about your computer. I'm talking about the proper ways to deposit your (non-recyclable) trash and garbage onto your driveway for trash day. Your choices:

-- Place your normal-sized plastic barrel, with its lid on, to greet the trash truck. This is simple and keeps animals from attacking your trash and garbage. The downsides, though, are (a) your lid may later be found (if at all) in Bangladesh, having rolled down your driveway in the wind or tossed by a Frisbee-obsessed trash-man; and (b) eventually your barrel will collapse like a deflated balloon from having been bashed against the side of the truck's mechanized lift so many times.

-- Or, you can, after trash-day, insert a heavy-duty plastic bag into your barrel, which should stay in your garage. Then, during the week, you dump all non-garbage trash into that bag-lined barrel. All garbage is *first* dumped into a kitchen-based plastic bag; that bag is then tied and deposited into the barrel. On trash day, the bag-liner is removed from the barrel; tied; and placed outside for pickup. Advantage: Your barrel remains clean, nothing gunky sticks to its interior walls; your barrel never sees the light of day or the clutches of the trash-men; and your barrel lid doesn't suffer. However, this alternative requires:

-- You must not place that trash bag outside on the night before trash day, but only on trash day itself. Otherwise, the many animals that call Pelican Pointe home will smell the garbage (even through the two layers of plastic) and will tear apart your bags like the poor kids in *Slumdog Millionaire*. The resulting mess is yours to clean up; the trash-men won't do it for you. As they say on entering Yellowstone, *Don't feed the bears*.

Dyslexia. Your purple recycling barrel was designed to be picked up automatically by a mechanical arm, which protrudes from the recycling truck as part of the emptying maneuver. To enable this feat, it is essential that you place your purple barrel *about 4" from your outside wall, with its handle facing the wall*. Otherwise, the recycling truck must make two passes, with the truck going forward into the driveway, and then backward into that driveway. "Give me land, lots of land, under starry skies above. Don't fence me in," are the lyrics to an insipid western ditty. However, you are already "fenced in" by your porch or patio railings. These railings take a beating from the weather, and from flower containers set on the top rail or posts (which containers we strongly encourage in season). Some railings sag from anticipatory senility (Don't we all?). Whose responsibility is it to maintain that railing? Our Boards, over the years, have consistently maintained that each such railing must be maintained by the homeowner whose porch/patio it encloses. Support for this conclusion is found in our recorded Covenants, Sec. 8.2, which places the responsibility on the owner for his/her concrete patio and porch. The railing is an integral part of that porch or patio. Also, Sec. 1.10 describes "limited common areas" as areas intended "for the use of fewer than all owners," describing (as examples) window boxes, awnings, and patios – for which items the owner is responsible.

Accordingly, some of you may be receiving a notice from our management to repair or restore your railing. The necessity for such upkeep is obvious: These railings are a major visible feature on our buildings' facades. If you are so notified, and want recommendations of contractors who have proven to be reliable and reasonable for such work, contact our management.

Facts About Home Holiday Fires

- One of every three home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious. On average, one of every 40 reported home structure Christmas tree fires results in a death compared to an average of one death per 142 total reported home structure fires.
- A heat source too close to the tree causes roughly one in every six of Christmas tree fires.
- More than half (56%) of home candle fires occur when something that can catch on fire is too close to the candle.
- December is the peak time of year for home candle fires. In December, 11% of home candle fires began with decorations compared to 4% the rest of the year.
