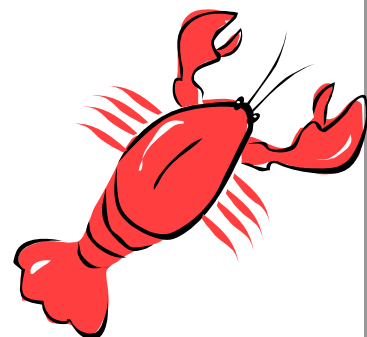

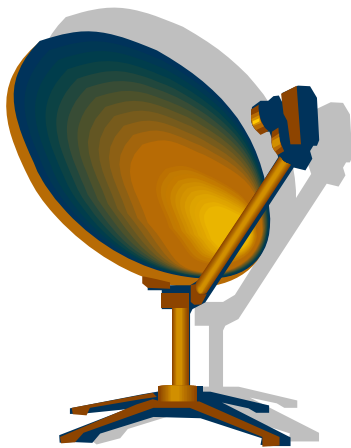
Daylight Saving Time starts on March 9. Don't forget to reset your clocks! It's also a great time to check the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors!

Susman Unleashed

Federal law requires our HOA to permit the installation of a satellite dish when requested, **but** the law entitles your Association to dictate the location of the dish above your unit (provided that the satellite signal isn't obstructed). This limitation enables the HOA to maintain some modest measure of architectural control. Therefore, we have a simple document called *Guidelines for the Installation of Satellite Dishes* and a one-page request form. **Before** you order such installation, you must comply with those *Guidelines*. Obtain the latest *Guidelines* from our management company, and the form at www.pelicanpointe.net (FAQs). After our Architectural Control Committee and Board have approved your installation, you are ready to “veg out,” and watch marathon sessions of serialized television shows, and to gorge left-over pretzels from your mesmerized Olympics-watching; and to feel guilty for bypassing the gym that day.

Noah's Ark allegedly carried “two of every species.” In the flood, his manifest probably didn't include two persons from Pelican Pointe.
