<u>"Garbage in; garbage out"</u> is a well-known verity in computer struggles. In last month's *The Pelican Brief*, you were notified of our new Rule prohibiting the use of garbage bags (instead of barrels with lids) on trash-day. Here is the actual wording, as formally adopted by your Board on April 21, 2014:

"Rule III(D) is hereby amended by the addition of the following: The use of paper or plastic bags to contain trash awaiting pick-up is prohibited, unless such bags are contained within a trash can with a lid thereon. Trash cans shall not exceed 32-gallon size, nor weigh more than 50 pounds filled. Trash outside the trash can may include objects acceptable to the trash-haulers. However, in no event shall garbage or the remains of food, foodstuffs, food preparation products, or their original containers, or plants or flowers, be placed outside such trash cans. Note: Use of the City-supplied recycling bins for qualified recyclable items is recommended."

The effective date for this new Rule is June 1, 2014. Fines will be imposed for non-compliance. Qualified trash cans can be found at the major big-box and other stores. My research discloses that a good plastic barrel with lid is about \$12. I painted my unit number on my new barrel and lid, even though the lid may eventually be destined, by wind or Frisbee-toss, for Nepal.

You don't have to be a "greenie" environmentalist to place your recycling barrel correctly. The specially-equipped trucks that empty your purple recycling barrel lift and empty it with a mechanical arm. That operation requires your barrel's handle to be about 4" from the wall, not facing the other direction. Robotic arms do wonderful things, but twisting your mis-positioned barrel 180-degrees isn't one of them. Also, note that the following items are not recyclable: Plastic bags; polystyrene foam (Styrofoam); plastic film; food waste; video and cassette tapes.

<u>I'd prefer to receive the latest Victoria's Secret catalog</u>, but it'd be more practical to receive the annual brochure from the Denver Department of Public Works, entitled *Waste Wise Denver* [See below]. This brochure provides the annual schedules, by month, for our regular trash-day pick-ups, the recycling pick-ups, and the large-item pick-ups. Complementing this information is our long-standing Rule governing the placement of trash containers for pick-up. You should not place your trash container in your driveway before 7:00 p.m. on the night before the scheduled trash-day. You must retrieve your container from the driveway no later than 11 p.m. on trash day. If you are unable to conform to that schedule, ask your neighbor to handle the placement and retrieval in your absence. With our new "trash container Rule" [see above], it's not a major imposition for your neighbor. He/she will reciprocate the favor with a dozen chocolate-chip cookies.

<u>It's true: In life, "there is no free lunch."</u> However, Denver has a program that will send you free pet waste bags. It isn't clear whether there is a "waiting list" for this largesse, nor how many bags you'll receive, nor when, nor whether you can obtain additional ones.
