# **HOA treasurer shares 2019 Financial Report**

This past year was a challenging one for our Association. For the first time in years, we recorded a year-end operating deficit of \$34,500. The deficit is largely due to last year's intense winter storms and increasing snow removal costs.

Our costs of operations continue to go up every year and we are faced with unexpected and unbudgeted repairs around our aging property for things such as tree removal and front gate repairs. All of this will have to be considered more closely in future budgeting years.

Last year, we contributed \$120,000 of your annual dues into our Reserve Fund bringing the 2019 year-end Reserve Fund total to \$694,000.

During 2020, we are planning a third concrete repair project, and we will begin the first phase of our exterior building painting and siding repairs. Based on the bids we are reviewing now, we anticipate these capital expenditures costing us about \$325,000. We have budgeted \$126,000 in annual dues to reserves this year. This amount will not cover the anticipated 2020 capital costs and therefore the Board will be reviewing projected capital fund expenses for the next 2 to 3 years to determine if we should begin increasing our annual budget contributions to the Reserve Fund. Maintaining healthy reserves is critical to all current and prospective Pelican Pointe homeowners.

We want to keep residents better informed about these financial challenges so look for more news as we move through the new year.

The next Board meeting is Monday, Feb. 17, 6 p.m. at the Windsor Gardens Community Center. All homeowners are encouraged to attend.

The aftermath of the big Thanksgiving week snow was front and center as I took my place on the Board in December. Heard you loud and clear that the snow piles at the end of the alleyways need to be pushed far enough to maintain access to our end unit garages. We are following up on this concern.

Fast moving cars is another concern that has come up once again. Walking on our sidewalks recently to pick up my mail, a red, compact SUV, I believe, came through at what was clearly an excess speed. I shouted "Slow down!" and made a hand motion as well. In this case at least, it seemed to work. I noticed the vehicle slow down significantly. Thank you, whoever you are. Sometimes, all it takes is a reminder. Our posted speed limit on the sign is 15 mph. I try to remember to go even slower. I hope all of you will, too.

We have noticed a lot of roof granules coming off our shingles; more than seem "normal." There was a recent inspection and shingle samples are being evaluated. Once the Board has the results we can provide an update in this newsletter.

I've spent some time digging into our finances, going through the Reserve Study and getting briefed by our Treasurer Jim Bernuth. I've contributed to Jim's article on finances as noted on page one.


