'Tis the season, coyotes prowling the Pelican Pointe property

Many Pelican Pointe residents take a walk or walk their dogs at dawn and/or in the evening. Those times also are when coyotes are most active, especially during their mating season from January through mid-March meaning they are bolder and more aggressive during these hours. Also, some of their nearby natural habitat has been disrupted due to the construction across the High Line Canal.

As noted in this newsletter last month, residents had reported seeing coyotes near patios and driveways. Since then, additional sightings have been shared. One resident reported that a coyote tore into a package left by Amazon.

Don't mistake a coyote for a stray dog. If you happen to encounter a coyote, wave your arms, make yourself as big as possible and yell loudly to make noise which is known to spook them into running away. During this season of increased aggression, be on alert. Always keep your dog on a leash and do not let them outdoors unsupervised. The volunteer Landscape Committee already is working on planting options for the beds at the entrance to Pelican Pointe. In past years, colorful annuals were planted. This change can help with maintenance, as well as, trim costs in the years ahead.

Scheduling other landscape work throughout the community is dependant on the weather. Snow piles from February's storms are still at the ends of many alleys and are slowly melting. While spring technically begins March 20, on average in Colorado, March and April are our snowiest months. A Denver native, Francisco picked beans as a kid for ten cents a bushel and worked in restaurants. He dropped out of Manual High School, then 30 years later, he testified against Denver Public Schools in federal court.



Francisco served in the U.S. Coast Guard as a radio operator in the Pacific and took correspondence to complete his GED. After he was honorably discharged, he continued his studies at the University of Hawaii, then

completed a BA degree in English at the University of Denver. A few years later, Francisco earned a PhD in Modern Languages from the University of Oklahoma. He also was awarded a prestigious Fulbright Scholarship to the University of Madrid in Spain.

Francisco was a Spanish professor at the University of Colorado at Denver for 30 years. But before settling into his professor role, he and Laverne got married. They'll celebrate their anniversary this month.


